MTA cops rake in six figures

Some officers work overtime to boost pay to as much as \$216K, amNewYork review finds

The MTA police force is raking it in with extra shifts.

The cash-strapped agency paid out \$17.2 million in overtime last year to its officers, MTA records



show, with nearly two-thirds of the force earning more than \$100,000 when adding in the extra pay.

"What are they doing to earn that much?" asked straphanger Jennifer

McReynolds, 25, of Greenpoint.

MTA police officers, who patrol the commuter rails, the Staten Island Railway, Penn Station and Grand Central, were given a base salary of between \$39,000 and \$88,000 in 2009. However, an amNewYork review of their pay found that many boost their earnings with overtime.

Here are some of the findings:

- Sixteen officers made more than the department chief's salary of \$163,550.
- The top 10 earners made between \$184,280 and \$216,900, more than double their salaries.
- Overtime for the top three earners jumped by more than \$40,000 between 2007 and 2009.

"Those numbers look like the kind of salary [Mayor] Bloomberg would get," said Sergei Krasikov, 31, a Brooklyn rider.

The MTA police stepped up its patrolling of trains and stations beginning in 2007, which required

overtime, said MTA spokesman Kevin Ortiz. A multimillion-dollar federal grant covered the bulk of the extra expense.

"In order to ensure the safety and security of our customers, some overtime is necessary," Ortiz said. The MTA reduced police overtime by 7 percent between 2008 and 2009 as part of a larger effort to slash costs, Ortiz said, but raises for officers meant the overtime only dipped by about \$200,000.

Outed as hypocrites

Yet another anti-gay zealot in sex scandal

Yet another religious leader who fought gay rights apparently doesn't practice what he preaches.

Alan George Rekers, known as a staunch anti-gay activist who champions "curing" homosexuals, solicited a 20-year-old male

hooker online from the website rentboy.com, according to a published report. The Baptist minister then reportedly took his escort for a 10day romp through Europe last month.

Rekers, 61, a co-founder of Christian lobbying group Family Research Council, said he only hired the man to help carry his bags. But he visited rentboy.com, an escort website filled with images of scantily clad men for hire, the Miami New Times said. In a statement, Rekers called the report "slanderous."

The allegation drew parallels to former Florida Rep. Mark Foley, evangelical pas-

"He's a spectacular hypocrite who's done great harm to our community," Wayne Besen of Truth Wins Out, which fights gay disinformation, said of Rekers.

Council yesterday distanced itself from Rekers, saying it has no contact with him. 'While we are extremely disappointed when any Christian leader engages in the very activities that

they 'preach' against, it is not surprising. The Scriptures clearly teach the fallen nature of all people," Council President Tony Perkins said




Sarah Chinn of CUNY's Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies, argued that the alleged outing perpetuates a dangerous stereotype.

"It feeds into this sort of pop psychology that people who are homophobes are secretly gay and they're repressing their desires," she said. "No, they're homophobic because they hate gays."

Besen countered that the incident clears up another misconception.

More cash for catch of day?

If you think buying seafood in the city is expensive now, there's a good chance it'll get worse during the next few weeks.

Chefs and fish distributors in Gotham predict that the cost of shrimp, crabs and oysters will be most impacted by the twoweek-old oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

"We are planning on getting a lot of crabs coming up from there soon and we may have to rethink that," said Laurence Edelman, executive chef at Mermaid Oyster Bar.

At Fairway supermarkets there is speculation that shrimp prices may spike more than 25 percent. "We've been told the price of shrimp will go up \$2

a pound," said Tony Maltese, seafood director at Fairway. While most of the shrimp

Coast provides 75 percent of the U.S. supply, said Gavin Gibbons, of the National Fisheries Institute. Similarly, it is home to nearly 70 percent of the U.S. oyster production.

Gibbons said that mollusks are most vulnerable to oil spills because they can't swim away. "For oysters, it's going to be a disaster,"

'Terrorist' began as tourist?

Shahzad had fun in Times Square years before bomb attempt

A year or two before he allegedly tried to blow up part of Times Square, Faisal Shahzad posed for a cheery group photo at the Crossroads of the World.

The photo of the wannabe terrorist, obtained by CBS News, was released amid revelations that he had packed the SUV with fireworks that couldn't destroy a watermelon.

Further details emerged of his allegedly amateurish attempt to wreak havoc in the heart of the city.

The New York Post reported Shahzad had done a trial run the night before and left a getaway car nearby.

Then he reportedly left the keys for that vehicle in the bomb-laden Nissan Pathfinder, forcing him to ride a Metro-North train home to Connecticut, the Post reported.

The sloppy trail quickly led inves-

tigators to Shahzad, who seemed to know the jig was up.

"I was expecting you. Are you NYPD or FBI?" Shahzad asked customs officials who came aboard the jet to arrest him, an official with knowledge of the investigation told The Associated Press.

The government yesterday sought to close the security gap that let Shahzad board the plane even though his name had earlier been placed on a no-fly list, mandating that airlines check the list more frequently.

Authorities said Shahzad has

Bomb scare could rile Pakistan relations

The botched Times Square bombing — and suspect Faisal Shahzad's confession that he received terror training in his native

Pakistan — has placed a spotlight on U.S. relations with the Mideast country. It also has

Pakistani immigrants, 300,000 of whom live in Gotham, fearful about backlash.

amNewYork spoke with Mohsin Zaheer, editor of the Brooklyn-based Pakistani newspaper Sada-E-Pakistan, about the tensions.

How has the city's Pakistani community reacted to the plot? Everybody is condemning it, even the religious leaders, the imams of the mosques. That's not Islam.

Are you worried about backlash? People are a little bit worried that anybody could react or overreact, just by looking at them. [A Pakistani New Yorker] said yesterday he went to the store and the salesman looked at his face and he said, "Where are you from?"

Pakistani Foreign Minister Rehman Malik yesterday told the BBC that Shahzad is the responsibility of the U.S., because he became a citizen. Should the U.S. or Pakistan be blamed for his actions? I don't believe that he's American or he's a Pakistani, he's just a terrorist.

Pakistani militants and civilians are weary of U.S. drones in their country and a war raging in neighboring Afghanistan. Does the Times Square incident further strain U.S.-Pakistan relations? There's going to be more pressure on the government of Pakistan from the U.S. side to do more, to go deep into the areas where this kind of people could be

U.K. election could end with no winner

There's only one good bet in Britain's razor-edge election: It's likely to reshape the country's politics in historic

Should Gordon Brown cling to power, his Labour Party will have pulled off one of the most unlikely political comebacks in modern times. Victory for the Conservatives' David Cameron would return his once-discredited party to office after 13 years.

More likely, there will be no clear winner, and a good showing for Liberal Democrat upstart Nick Clegg.

"This could go down as one of the most revolutionary elections," said Bill Jones, a political analyst at Liverpool Hope University.

A survey by Populus for the Times of London put support for the Conservatives at 37 percent, with Labour getting 28 percent and the Liberal Democrats 27 percent. The Times calculated that would give the Conservatives a total of 301 seats in Parliament - 25 short of a majority.

Queen may have to pick future U.K. leader

What if there is a hung Parliament? Under British convention, Gordon Brown as the incumbent leader is offered the first chance to seek support from his rivals to form a coalition government, even if his party ranks second or third in the popular vote.

What happens if he can't form a coalition or pact?

Brown is most likely to resign as prime minister. He

could hang on until the first meeting of Parliament on May 18, but the opposition would likely attempt to force a motion of no confidence in his

government. At that stage, the queen invites the leader of the largest party — most likely the Conservatives - to form a government.

Greek riots turn deadly

Fire kills 3 at bank amid revolt over vital cuts

Rioting over harsh austerity measures left three people dead yesterday in a torched Athens bank and clouds of tear gas drifting past parliament.

The deaths were the first during a protest in Greece in nearly 20 years.

Fear that a financial bailout won't stop the debt crisis from spreading to other troubled EU countries such as Portugal and Spain intensified amid the violence yesterday, as credit ratings agency Moody's put Portugal on watch for a possible downgrade.

Greece faces a May 19 due date on debt it says it can't repay without the help. The new government cutbacks, which slash salaries and pensions for civil servants and hike consumer

taxes, are being imposed as a condition of getting a \$142.16 billion package of rescue loans from the International Monetary Fund and the other European

Union countries that use the euro as their currency.

Many Greeks realize some cutbacks are necessary to pull their country, which has a massive debt

ten gruff House veteran of four decades and powerful Appropriations Committee chairman dealt Democrats defending their majority another blow headed



Unless you have a good reason, don't carry anything that contains your personal information, such as your Social Security number or passwords, McCormack advised.

To help you quickly spring into action in the event of the loss or theft of your wallet, keep photocopies of all your cards, front and back, in a safe place at home.



Toronto band **Scene** slims down its roster for tour stealers

Ask any resident of Toronto, current or former, and he or she will likely either know a member of Broken Social Scene or know someone who knows one.

The sprawling Canadian collective, which has claimed upward of 15 members at times, serves as a common cultural touchstone - a Kevin Bacon for the Canadian music scene, if you will.

On stage

Broken Social Scene is playing sold-out shows at Webster Hall on Friday and Music Hall of Williamsburg on Saturday.

So at first the band's move to a six-person unit might come as a surprise. Cofounder Brendan Canning said, however, that it should not be considered novel that BSS would dream it all up differently for its new album.

"It's what always happens with [the band]," he said.

"You just make a couple of decisions, hope they're right and then let the ebb and flow take us where it may.'

That decision to drill down to a smaller unit comes at least partially from necessity. So many of the other musicians who have helped out in the past are busy with their own successful careers.

"We relied on all these people for so long, but they were always on borrowed time," Canning said.

In the end, though, it's Canning, co-founder Kevin Drew and company holding down the fort for what has become a signature sound these past eight years.

"We've done the swirly, swishy sounds," Canning said. "We reserved it a bit and tightened up the song structure. But at the core of it, it's still the sound of Broken Social Scene.'

'Iron' back in his element

Iron Man 2

Superhero sequels rarely are as good as the movies that spawn them, and "Iron Man 2" is no exception.

Robert Downey Jr. returns in seductive cocksure form as wealthy industrialist Tony Stark, who has now officially outed himself as the titular hero.

While his heroic antics have transformed him into a media darling, they've also ruffled the feathers of a few textbook villains.

One of them is Ivan Vanko (Mickey Rourke), a brilliant but disturbed Russian scientist whose beef with Stark (avenging a dead father) is of throwaway interest.

The other is Justin Hammer (Sam Rockwell), a weapons manufacturer who hires Vanko to create an army that will vanquish Iron Man and, as he puts it, land him a post in the

ha ha ha. As in the original "Iron Man," the sequel is sparing with fight scenes. The first scuffle occurs half an hour into the movie, and there are

really only two more noteworthy battles to follow. In the landscape of superhero movies, the "Iron Man" fran-

chise stands out for its thoughtful restraint: When you finally do arrive at an action scene, it feels purposeful.

Without explosions to distract you, though, the story becomes front and center, and this is where "Iron Man 2" flails. There are too many good guys and bad guys, leaving you with a diluted story. It's all more labored than the

None of this discounts "Iron Man 2" as a good old-fashioned popcorn movie. Watching Stark and Vanko pull off their improbable technical wizardry makes for way-above-par summer movie fare.

Five skin cancer misconceptions

The earlier skin cancer is caught, the easier it is to treat. But common misconceptions deter many people from getting marks checked

Here are five common excuses patients have for missing skin cancer.

"It wasn't raised""Most early melanomas are flat," said Florida dermatologist William Grisaitis, who said the big thing is whether the flat spot is changing or growing.

2'I was waiting for it to go away.' Some people mistake a

basal cell carcinoma for a pimple or razor bump. "The basal cell may last more than a month at the same location," said Dr. Murad Alam, professor at Northwestern University. If a lesion hasn't healed in six to eight weeks, have it checked.

7 'It's where the sun doesn't shine.'

Melanoma can occur anywhere on the body.



When it comes to skin cancer, don't only look for large marks on your body. Melanomas can be a few millimeters wide.

"Look at your scalp, groin, soles and buttocks," said Lee Laris, an Arizona dermatologist. "If it has skin, it can get skin cancer.

4'My moles didn't change.'

An evolving mole can indicate melanoma. But the most common type of skin cancer is basal cell carcinoma, which isn't a mole but a pink pearly bump often found on the face, ears and

upper back, said California dermatologist Raphael Darvish.

L'It was tiny'

"People tend to worry about spots that are big [but] melanomas can be a few millimeters wide," said Alam, "Size does not equate with dangerousness." Nonmelanoma skin cancers can also be subtle, Alam said, and may be slightly raised red or crusty areas.

Tips to ward off icky ticks

As the weather heats up, the ticks come out. Here are eight tips from the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station for protecting yourself this summer:

√ Light is best. Lightcolored clothing makes ticks easier to spot.

√ Wear insect repellent. Most of the chemicals that repel mosquitoes are somewhat effective against ticks, although it may take a heavier concentration of DEET — between 30 and 40 percent — to really keep them

Permethrin is a stronger chemical that kills ticks as well as repels them.

√ Stay in the middle of a path. Ticks can't fly or jump, so they can

only get on you if you come into contact with the kind of environment they live in: moist, shady, wooded areas. with leaves and

low-lying plants. √ Inspect yourself. Especially the legs and groin. Most ticks probably get picked up on the lower legs and then climb upward.

The chances of contracting Lyme disease are minimized if a tick is removed soon after it's attached, and there's no risk if it's still crawling around. The shower is a good place to conduct a check.

√ Remove gently. Use tweezers to grab the tick as close to the skin as possible.

√Put clothes in the drver. Deer ticks and lone star ticks can survive a hotwater wash, but an hour in a dryer will kill them.

Study: Happy people have happy immune systems

A recent study published in Psychological Science finds that those with more optimistic attitudes had better-functioning immune systems, which, in turn, helped them ward off illnesses.



Yet far too many of us assume that optimism is an inborn trait. That's a wrong assumption, said James Maddux, psychology professor at George Mason University. Can people learn to be optimists? "The answer is an indisputable yes," said Maddux.

Maddux recommended aiming for a balance between accepting responsibility for some of the bad circumstances and taking action (i.e., looking for another job or joining





Attention, parents: Consider these application dos and don'ts

Many parents are puzzled about their part in the college admissions process. You want your kids to get the best education at a price you can afford. But it's also key to let your child take the reins.

"Parents can and should play a [sup-porting role]," said Sally P. Springer, co-author of "Admission Matters: What Students and Parents Need to Know About Getting into College. "But ide-

ally, the child should own the process.'

These tips will help you achieve the delicate balance between being too hands-off and getting overly

Do listen carefully.

Encourage your teen to think carefully about the kind of school they want to

"Students do much better academically if they attend the college of their choice," Jose Flores, president of the New York State Association for College Admissions Counseling. "Parents should not make the selection, although they can certainly help kids seek out infor-

Do talk about finances.

Early in the process, have a frank conversation about how much your family can afford to spend. If a child is drawn to a school that's beyond your budget, make sure he or she fully understands the burden of excessive student debt.

DO help out.

Some teens are on autopilot when it comes to applying to college, while others need a push. For

a reluctant kid, figure out a system (a big note in the kitchen, e-reminders to his cell phone or computer) to help him keep track of dates and deadlines.

Don't do too much.

No doubt you could bang out that college essay that's been taking your daughter all month, but resist the urge. Admissions officers can easily spot polished prose that's been penned by mom or dad. Instead, offer to read her work and make suggestions for improvement. Review application materials for misspellings, grammar mistakes and

Do limit discussion.

If you aren't careful, the subject of college could dominate every conversation. Some families find it helpful to carve out a set period to discuss the matter. If you focus too much on the topic, you risk turning off even the most motivated kid.

Guidance counselor

A good counselor can make recommendations based on admissions requirements and a student's academic record, as well as what kind of school would make a good fit.

Teachers

A favorite teacher can be helpful in getting your child to think about potential colleges, programs and potential majors. Teachers can also help reviewing college essays and writing letters of recommendation.

Independent counselor

You could hire a private counselor to help research schools and coach your child through the application process. Some parents say that having a neutral third party eliminates family stress. But be careful: Be sure to research a counselor's background very carefully and seek recommendations from friends before hiring.

How helpful are college rankings?

Americans love to rank things.

We need to know which NFL team has the best defense, who makes the most money in the world and which city has the most pizzerias. We can't get enough.

So it's not surprising that college rankings are a hot topic among collegebound students and their parents.

Not only do these reports satisfy our desire to know which school is "best," but they also feel like a guidepost when we sit down with our seniors to help them make one of the biggest decisions of their lives.

Difficult to compare

The problem is that college rankings don't tell you which school is best for your child. And nobody — except maybe the people doing the ranking — seems sure that it's possible to quantify and then compare what happens on different campuses across the country.

But that doesn't stop plenty of publications and organizations from trying. The most popular of the bunch is U.S. News & World Report's annual rankings.

Each year, the editors solicit data from about 1,500 American colleges and then, based on criteria the editors




have established, give a numeric value to each school.

Colleges provide data

It's key to keep in mind that colleges provide the vast majority of the data and the schools have a vested interest in boosting their spots on the list.

Several media reports in recent years have revealed that a handful of school officials have fudged their numbers to inch up a few spots on the list.

Another troubling area is the criteria. For example, 25 percent of a school's



academic quality score is "peer assessment," or what other college officials many miles and states away — say about a particular school.

Check other avenues

That said, other organizations seem to have taken into account the criticisms lobbed at the U.S. News rankings and have shifted their criteria to focus more on quality of teaching and learning.

The most notable of this group is the Center for College Affordability and Productivity (CCAP), a nonprofit research

group that examines issues related to how well or poorly higher education works.

CCAP teams up with Forbes to produce its list of the best American colleges, published each August. '

Student evaluations at ratemyprofessor.com make up 25 percent of a school's score, and national academic awards won by students and faculty make up 13.3 percent, while things like debt load and four-year graduation rates weigh heavily as well.

Compare lists

Still, no list is perfect, and you should resist the temptation to let rankings persuade you to feel good or bad about a particular campus.

If you really must peek, check out several lists rather than putting too much weight on any one published account of "the best." Take a close look at the criteria, and consider how well it reflects the qualities you want in a college.

And if you just can't help giving credence to these annual lists, remember that rankings are probably good for at least one thing: starting a lively conversation.

Brooklyn Heights lives up to its rarefied rep

Brooklyn Heights is both defined by its proximity to Manhattan and how dramatically it differs from its neighbor.

Financial District workers and others trade the noise of the city for the neighborhood's quiet, tree-lined streets, while an alphabet soup of subway lines means they don't have to worry

about being far from the action.

Other amenities, including the Brooklyn Heights Promenade along with the emerging Brooklyn Bridge Park, provide other draws.

Once a neighborhood for wealthy merchants, Brooklyn Heights later attracted a who's who of writers and other artists, including Truman Capote and Bob Dylan during its more bohemian

(and less expensive) period as the neighborhood began to gentrify.

Today, thanks to protection in 1965 as the city's first historic district, the area boasts many blocks of picturesque row houses, brownstones and 19thcentury mansions.

One drawback is a relative lack of racial diversity, but John Loscalzo, founder and publisher of Brooklyn Heights Blog, said the neighborhood has changed from the closed society that once preferred private gardens to public parks.

'We're a lot more welcoming and open place than it might have been before, Loscalzo said. "The neighborhood is definitely moving into the 21st century.'

TO SEE

As the city's first historic district, Brooklyn Heights is a great place to immerse yourself in New York City's past. It was here where George Washington fought his first and biggest battle of the American Revolution and where Jackie Robinson signed his history-making baseball contract. Add to that some of the city's bestpreserved early-19th-century houses, and you've got some excellent sightseeing on your hands. Just pick up a free self-guided tour map at the Brooklyn Historical Society on Pierrepont Street

New York Transit Museum

and you're good to go.

Schermerhorn Street and Boerum Place, 718-694-5100

The holy grail for subway geeks, this engaging museum is located in an unused subway station that was once part of the IND Fulton Street Line, better known as the A train. For just \$5, you can check out train cars of various eras, from 1917 to today, get a demo of the switchboards and pretend you're on the set of the psychodrama "The Taking of Pelham One Two Three," shot here in 1974.

Slaves once escaped to freedom with the help of this 19th-century church, which served as a "station" on the Underground Railroad. There is also a fragment of Plymouth Rock in the church,

where Henry Ward Beecher, brother of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" author Harriet Beecher Stowe, was the first pastor.

Brooklyn Dodgers Headquarters

Jackie Robinson's historic signing as the first African-American Major League Baseball player

took place at the former headquarters of the Brooklyn Dodgers. Today the building is gone, but the location is marked with a plaque at 215 Montague St. A few blocks east, you can see the historic Bossert Hotel, where the Dodgers celebrated their World Series win in 1955, three years before moving to Los Angeles.

It's nothing new that Brooklyn Heights and the Downtown Manhattan Heliport are close neighbors. What angry residents say is new is the amount of air traffic coming in and out of the aviation hub, just a hop across the East River.

John Loscalzo, publisher and founder of Brooklyn Heights Blog, said helicopter noise is a top quality-of-life complaint.

"It's creating a constant drone," Loscalzo said. "It's like 30 of your closest neighbors decided to mow the lawn all at once."







You've got your work cut out for you, huh? Part of the reason I took [this job] is [the 2003 book] "Moneyball."

What other people don't value, you value? Bingo. And then I quantify it. ... The baseball analogy was on-base percentage. ... I think the basketball analogy is passing. ... Good passers give you good

shots — you get layups, 3s.

What's your favorite part of recruiting? Evaluating, actually. I can sit in a gym for 20 hours watching games. I don't like to have to find the number, the e-mail, and that part.

This infusion of new coaches into the New York area all at once is strange, isn't it? It is bizarre. No other way around it. ... As far as scouting, recruiting, I've got to get my feet wet a little bit. That learning curve is going to be a little steep.


